**NO INTERSTATE COMPACT REPRESENTATIVE – NO UPDATES AVAILABLE**

**JEFF HANSEN & GREG LAY – D.O.C.**

**Governor’s Re-Entry Council** – Would like feedback from PO’s in the field about issues they are having with Sex Offenders transitioning into the community from prison. Ideas for solutions? Linda Hamilton (Lane Co.) suggested that a PO be on the Council so there is a better understanding of what is needed.

**OSP-M has closed due to budget cuts.** Sex Offender transition services have stopped; however some are beginning in the institution in Lakeview.

**Statewide Reach-In presentations:** No further word on reach-in presentations throughout the State. Jeff Hansen will speak with Cindy Booth.

**DEBBIE MARTIN - OYA**

Debbie asked about barriers or issues PO’s may be having with attempting reach-ins with those offenders releasing to adult supervision:

**Multnomah Co.:** No real problems with the offenders, but the families do not seem very well prepared. They are not helpful, and at times seem unprepared for offender to return to the home. Recommend more education to the families about how the adult system works, and what to expect.

Polygraph and evaluation/treatment info is not being forwarded to PO. **NOTE: PO'S MUST USE THE OYA RELEASE OF INFORMATION.** Debbie will forward the form to SOSN for distribution.

Debbie will take the requests back to the institutions, and will ask for counselors to have offenders sign an ROI before they are released. **BARRIER:** Not enough manpower.

Debbie described differences in OYA sex offender treatment vs. adult sex offender treatment in the community:

- More open-ended, psychodynamic (not as structured)
- Moving toward more correctional/behavioral treatment (EBP)
- Should still be doing polygraph's
- Moving away from processing trauma or clarification
- There is not the same level of relapse prevention work, etc. as there is with community treatment programs.

There is the threat of several OYA institutions being closed; however, a decision has been postponed until March 2011, per the Emergency Board.

- 300 beds = 1/3 of population, and 43% = DOC offenders, and 38% are S/O's
- Will look at time, risk, needs, etc., as to where offenders will be transferred

### **SETH PROUSER - POLYGRAPH MODULE**

This is not a trackable program, and will not be shown on your generated To-Do List

**ACCESS:** OPT 33 or F11, 4, W

**CREATE:** F6

- Date, Test Type (F4), Test Result (F4): "OTHER" = any unusual circumstance
- Notes (F8 = Change): Enter significant info, including disclosures

**AUTO-CHRONO:** An entry into the polygraph module creates an auto-chrono, which you are able to edit from the offender's chrono history. **REMEMBER:** If you delete a module entry, delete the auto-chrono, as well.

### **OPEN DISCUSSION**

**Arguments on both sides as to whether habituation with polygraphs is an issue.** End result: PO's should be practicing whatever is considered Evidence Based Practices as reported by the APA; however, keeping in mind that some counties are limited to available resources.

**Inactive Parole/PPS/Probation:** How are PO's tracking polygraphs due, moving issues, etc? Jeff Hansen stated that when offenders are placed on Inactive status, *there is no supervision*. Recommends early termination for those probationers who qualify for Inactive Probation.

**Policies for family reunification?** Lane Co. is working on a consistent process for reunifying offenders with their families. Most processes involve the treatment providers, PO, family, and sometimes DHS. Concerns voiced over some treatment provider practices.

**Treatment provider concerns:** Katie Gotch (Mult Co) suggests PO's contact the Oregon Health Licensing Agency (OHLA) about any issues or concerns regarding licensure, grievances, etc. Providers and PO's should be sharing information, assessments and treatment plans for mutual clients.

**Are we over-supervising sex offenders?** Agreed that offenders should be supervised based on research and risk, *not by conviction or prescribed conditions*. Trust our validated risk assessment tools and follow Evidence Based Practices.

**SO Package B – per PO:** It is easier to have the conditions and not need to enforce them, than try to add them after the fact. It is most important for offenders to have an assessment and full-disclosure polygraph to determine the necessity of specialized supervision for a Package B offender.

**Clarifying “pornography”:** The material must be reinforcing their deviancy. If a PO believes there is a violation, they must articulate to the Board or Hearings Officer why it is an issue, and how it is a risk factor. You should be able to include information from the offender’s Stable/Acute assessments.
